BRIDGEVILLE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN NEARS COMPLETION....



The Town of Bridgeville Comprehensive Plan is nearing completion. The Planning Commission and the University of Delaware's Institute of Public Administration have been working for over a year to develop the draft plan. Using information gathered at last September's Community Planning Workshop, the plan has been written to include elements involving land use, growth, annexation, historic resources, infrastructure, and transportation.

Your input is welcome and encouraged. There will be a public presentation on the plan draft scheduled for November or early December, and a public hearing will follow. Please continue to check with Town Hall regarding the dates, times, and places for these presentations. MINUTES FROM THE BOARD MEETINGS:JULY 9, 2001:

- There were 144 traffic arrests for June. Trucks stopped were 4.
- Three septic haulers for a revenue of \$3,420.
- The Delaware Housing Authority announced that Bridgeville will receive \$36,000 from the Community Development Block Grant Funds.
- The allotment for Bridgeville on the Municipal Street Aid is \$56,589.13 (approx. \$400 more than last year).
- The Senior Center was granted permission to hold a car wash on the parking lot across from Town Hall.
- Mr. Thomas O. Jefferson was presented with a Certificate of Appreciation for his renovation work on the Lofland Building and the Farmer Supply Building on Cannon Street.
- Residents who did not comply with a letter of request to remove their abandoned vehicles from their property will be contacted by the police department.
- The 1992 police vehicle was recently sold for \$2600.
- Fireside Chat is scheduled for July 31, 2001.

AUGUST 13, 2001:

- Councilman Finley Jones presented the Town with a check to help defray cost of remodelling back room in Town Hall for a downstairs meeting room.
- There were 169 traffic arrests and six trucks stopped in Town in July.
- There were four waste haulers for a revenue of \$3,678.
- Due to high water and flooding during rain storm (6.11") the lift station at Gateway Plaza went under water and had to be shut down due to the large amount of storm water run off that it was pumping to the WWTP. The lift station was started up on Sunday morning.
- Chief Parsons reported 66 letters were sent to residents who had abandoned cars on their property. Most residents cooperated with the request

Only six received a final notice on August 10th.

- The 1984 police van has been sold.
- Doug Jones suggested that a savings account be set up for replacement of water meters. Meters have a life expectancy of fifteen years (present meters are six years old).
- President Conaway stated the "Fireside Chats" have been very well attended.
- Chief Parsons is still working on updating the "animal ordinance".
- Delmarva Waste Management has purchased all of the "toters" that belonged to Superior.
- The raised water rate of 30 cents a thousand will set be set aside for much needed maintenance on the water tower.
- Certificates of Appreciation were given to the following:

Doug Jones, Phillip Mowbray, and Rick Passwaters for their efforts spent in cleaning up after the rain storm.

Kay Sue and Howard Hardesty for dedicated work to beautiful flowers barrels on Market Street.

Anita and Marshall Craft for the opening of the new ice cream parlor.

Ruth Ann Tull and Margaret Sipple for their constant care of the flowers around Town Hall.

Officer Church Manuszak for his quick response to a sick lady at Jimmy's Grille.

Each month the Commission will be awarding deserving residents of our community with these certificates.

SEPTEMBER 10, 2001:

- Ms. Marlene Elliott, State Director of the USDA Rural Development Program, presented the Town with a check for \$2,257,000 (\$1,000,000 in grant money, \$1,257,000 loan) for the upgrade of the wastewater plant. The loan will not start until the Town is actually ready to begin the upgrade.
- Certificates of Appreciation were presented to: Lester Williams, Jr., Brad Cannon, Clif Jackson, Bobb Dixon, Donald Smack, John Burbage,

and the Sussex Community Correction Center for the work on the Mt. Calvary Cemetery preservation.

- Commissioner Sipple will be contacting the Soil/Water Conservtion to seek help in repairing of the bulkhead on North Main Street.
- There were 93 traffic arrests and 5 truck arrests in August.
- There were 4 septic haulers for a revenue of \$3,799.
- On. Aug. 15 a representative from FEMA, DEMA and Councilman Jones toured the WWTP to see the water jamage from the rain storm of Aug. 12.
- The Town solicitor is in the process of drawing up an ordinance to allow for absentee voting in Town elections.
- Mosquito Control sprayed the Town on Wednesday, August 29th.
- On Saturday, Sept. 15th a Community Outreach Day will be held on Cannon and First Streets.
- The Town will meet with Cannon Cold Storage to try and resolve the back tax problem and the odor problem.
- The town employees's health insurance w remain with BCBS.
- The Community Development Block Grant Program will hold their annual hearing at the regular Commission meeting in October.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK...

Just a reminder the Tenth Annual Apple-Scrapple Festival will be held October 12 & 13th. This year's festival promises to be bigger and better than ever. The Apple-Scrapple Committee promises something for everybody and if this year's festival is anything like last year's, we are all in for a good time.

Because of our improving fiscal condition, the Town Commission was able to invest \$50,000 in a CD. This money will earn the Town additional funds and enhance our cash flow. Of course, this is without cost to the people of Bridgeville. We will continue to invest idle funds as they become available thus increasing Town revenues without seeking additional monies from the people of Bridgeville.

We are pleased to announce that our Town has received a grant of \$1 million dollars and a loan of \$1,257,000, a total of \$2,257,000 that we will be able to use to update our existing wastewater facilities. This grant-loan package is through the U.S.D.A. Rural Development program and will enable us to add a biological nutrient removal system to our current wastewater treatment facility thus meeting the new requirements of the Clear Water Act. The improvements to our treatment program will help protect the Nanticoke River and serve the needs of a growing Bridgeville Community. The funds are now available but we still must complete the engineering and land acquisition program necessary to complete these improvements. All of this has to be done with an eye towards obtaining more grant funding from other sources to make these new EPA requirements as less of a burden on our people as possible. We will update you periodically as we move through the steps necessary to bring these improvements on line.

The Town's Planning Commission continues to meet with the Institute of

Public Administration, the University of Delaware, to develop our first Comprehensive Land Use Plan for Bridgeville. This planning document will help direct the future of our Town for the next five years. Before it is adopted by the Town Commission, there will be a number of Public Hearings that will allow the citizens of Bridgeville the opportunity to have as much input as possible in the future direction of our Town.

Through the efforts of Commissioner Bill Jefferson, the meeting room for the Commission has been relocated to the first floor of the Town Hall. Bill did most of the work himself but a great deal of the painting was done by Alma Fleetwood, Lester Williams, Joann Conaway, with assistance from Commissioner Pat Correll. The President of Commission got more in the way than anything! Not only have we eliminated the stairs as problem for public access to our meeting room, we have reinstalled the front door of the Town Hall making the building more handicapped accessible. Please come see your facility.




