From the President's Desk

The Fourteenth Annual Apple Scrapple Festival will be held on Friday and Saturday, October 7th and 8th. This Festival has become the largest of its kind in Sussex County and it is only possible because of the efforts of a great number of volunteers and the cooperation of the people and businesses of Bridgeville. Local charities, youth groups and service organizations that participate will make the lion's share of their yearly budget at this annual event. Opening Ceremonies are scheduled for 6:15 p.m. on Friday, October 7th. For the first time this year, there will be an additional night of Carnival rides on Thursday evening specifically scheduled for the people of Bridgeville so that they can enjoy the rides without the crowds.

The Annual Scrapple Sling featuring local, state and federal elected officials is scheduled for Saturday, October 8th, at 1:30 p.m. This event and the Opening Ceremonies will be held on the stage directly behind the Fire Hall. The Commissioners look forward to seeing you throughout the Festival.

In the last Journal I reported to you that we had hired two new police officers and sent them off to be trained and certified through the State Police Training Program. It appears that when they were faced with the physical, often violent aspects of the job, they had second thoughts and resigned. That caused a problem; the only Training Academy left to us at that point was the City of Wilmington. Through the efforts of Chief Parsons we were able to reserve two seats in their Academy. Lightning struck again, but this time, only one of the cadets withdrew. At the present time, John Truluck is attending this Academy; it is our understanding that he is number one in his class and is truly an outstanding police recruit. We look forward to his graduation and his patrolling the streets of Bridgeville. Even with the addition of Officer Truluck, we are still short policemen; therefore, to bring our force to full strength, we have hired two new recruits, Mr. Robert James from Bridgeville and Mr. Robert Brode from Harrington. They are presently enrolled in the State Police Academy. We look forward to their graduation in January.

These new officers will be joining a core of outstanding policemen. At our September Commission meeting we gave Certificates of Appreciation to our Chief and three officers. Police Chief Parsons was awarded a certificate for scheduling our first ever Community Night Out; Patrolman Spicer received an award for outstanding work in drug enforcement; Patrolman First Class Hitchens received an award for his efforts on behalf of the Delaware Special Olympics; and Corporal Parker was awarded a certificate for entering a burning structure with the Bridgeville Fire Company and rescuing an individual who was asleep in the structure. We have the makings of an outstanding Police Force and we are extremely proud of the men who serve the people of Bridgeville.

Our revised and updated Zoning Ordinance will be introduced for public review and comment on October 3rd, at the monthly Commission meeting. The public hearing will take place on November 7th, at the monthly Commission meeting. Copies of this Ordinance will be available for review at the Town Hall and at the Bridgeville Library. They will also be on sale at the Town Hall.

I have resisted using this report for personal comments, but I have had a year to think about this, so here goes. Ever since I have been part of the Opening Ceremonies of the Apple Scrapple Festival, I have always invoked a prayer or asked all in attendance to pray. I have asked the Lord to protect the volunteers who defend us here and throughout the world every day - from the fire service, the police, the EMT's, the paramedics, to the members of our armed services who, every hour of every day, put their lives on the line for us. I have asked that we all remember them in our prayers. When I left the stage last year and as I passed through the crowd, I heard someone remark, "I didn't know we came here to pray." I quickly turned but was never able to identify the individual who made the remark. Those of you who know me realize that not being able to confront the individual at that point was probably the best thing that could have happened. In case that individual is here this year, come prepared to pray or don't come at all.

Minutes from the Monthly Commission Meetings

July 11, 2005

Traffic arrests for June were 163.

Eighteen building permits were issued in June bringing revenue of \$10,093.50.

Notices were issued for unlicensed vehicles, street and alley overgrowth and grass clippings.

Sink holes were filled on Cedar St. and Cooper Alley; trees were trimmed and weeds were sprayed.

St. Mary's Episcopal Church parking lot was striped.

Paving of streets and repairs are scheduled in July involving many locations in Town.

Consumer Confidence Reports for 2004 were mailed and hand delivered to customers in June.

Defective operating rods were replaced on seven hydrants.

The wastewater treatment plant cooperated with the Snow Hill, Maryland plant by lending a piece of equipment not in use locally. Our plant has been the benefactor of this type of cooperation in the past.

The Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control conducted an annual Bio-Solids Data Management System inspection at the wastewater treatment plant. Our data system was in order.

A Wastewater Facilities Assessment meeting was held to give the state and the Environmental Protection Agency an evaluation of the needs of wastewater facilities.

A Conditional Use Hearing was held on July 12th, with Rafail Properties, L.L.C., requesting permission to build another mini-storage building between Market and John Streets.

Municipal Street Aid funds from the State Department of Transportation are being reduced for FY-2006. Bridgeville will receive \$44,424.36, a reduction of approximately \$10,000.00. Suburban Street Aid Funds distributed to Senator Thurman Adams and Representative Ben Ewing have also been cut.

The Delaware State Housing Authority notified the Town that it will be the recipient, through Sussex County Council, of \$75,000.00 to do five housing rehabs.

Commission President Conaway reported the Town ended fiscal year 2005 in excellent financial shape.

Commissioners congratulated the owner at 305 Second St. for demolition and new home replacement. They also praised the improvements at 501 Market St. by the Jardevtan Corporation.

August 8, 2005

Traffic arrests for July were 194.

Sixteen building permits were issued in July bringing revenue of \$10,741.00 and 4 Certificates of Occupancy were issued to Heritage Shores.

A yearly inventory was taken in all departments of the Town.

New stop signs were installed.

55 water meters have been installed at Heritage Shores.

The Environmental Protection Agency quality assurance testing was conducted at the wastewater treatment plant.

Delaware Solid Waste Authority notified municipalities of landfill fee increases from \$58.50 to \$61.50 per ton effective July 1. There is no increase to residents for trash pick-up.

Ms Amanda Arrington, a Woodbridge High School junior, was employed by the Town under the State Summer Youth Program. Amanda assisted Street Superintendent Passwaters with many projects.

The Town is the recipient of \$1,500.00 for Tree Planting from the Department of Agriculture.

Mt. Olive Baptist Church presented a concern about local young people congregating during church services at a basketball hoop next door. Police Chief Parsons will monitor the situation.

Reverend Tulak from Union United Methodist Church addressed the Commission meeting concerning maintenance and supervisory needs at the Sanctuary for Kids Park. A meeting was scheduled to discuss the needs.

Bridgeville Public Library Director Carol Gasior received Commission approval to expand the Apple Scrapple Festival Carnival by adding a Thursday, October 6th, Carnival Night for the families of Bridgeville.

A letter was received from Delaware Secretary of Transportation Haywood stating a delay in the re-alignment of the Routes 13 and 404 intersection.

Commissioners signed a Resolution urging the Federal Base Realignment and Closure Commission to remove the Delaware National Guard Base in New Castle County from closure consideration.

Minutes from the Monthly Commission Meetings

September 12, 2005

Traffic arrests for August were 157.

Twenty-six building permits were issued in August bringing revenue of \$15,112.50.

Our Code Enforcement Constable continues to remind residents about grass clippings, tree and shrub trimmings and trash accumulation.

The House at 42 Church St. has been demolished and removed.

A hearing was held in Chancery Court regarding the demolition of the house at 38 Church St.

This is the 83rd consecutive month without a NPDES violation at the wastewater treatment facility.

High speed internet service was installed at the treatment plant.

The Street Department is researching various street sweepers for purchase by the Town.

There were 20 water meters installed and 11 water/sewer inspections at Heritage Shores in August.

A community-wide yard sale was held September 17th, and a Town Clean-up Day took place on September 24th.

Police officer interviews were held August 15th. Two candidates were hired and entered the Dover Police Academy on September 12th.

A thank you letter was received from Woodbridge School District regarding a donation from the Town of \$1,000.00 for the purchase of school uniforms.

The New Land Use and Development Code will be introduced for a first reading at the October Commission meeting, with a public hearing and adoption scheduled for the November meeting.

Commissioners voted to donate \$5,000.00 toward Hurricane Katrina relief. A similar-sized town will be chosen to assist re-building their Town government and emergency services.

The Town is proceeding with a storm water management plan preceding road improvements between the athletic fields and a new road for the proposed library.

Town Manager's Report

Clean up Day, held on September 24th, was very successful and there are many people to thank. M-T Trash did an excellent job and we appreciate their involvement. Thanks also goes to our Public Works Department staff, Rick Passwaters, Doug Jones and Phillip Mowbray. We are grateful for their assistance in helping the event run smoothly. We also appreciate our residents' cooperation. For the future, we would request that residents help us to discourage "out-of-towners" from dumping their trash on us. It is your Town and your money that pays for this special service.

Meetings have been held regarding needed maintenance and unwanted activity at the Children's Sanctuary Playground located on Market Street. The local Boy Scout Troop, the Kiwanis Club of Bridgeville and concerned citizens will move forward with needed repairs. Light wattage has been increased on the grounds and surveillance cameras will be installed to deter unwanted activity at the site. The police department also continues to monitor the area. Any citizen or civic group, etc. interested in helping, please contact the Union Methodist Church or the town office.

I had the honor of attending the dedication and naming of the Woodbridge High School shop building to the mem-

ory of Barry Cooper. Barry held the position of Director of Administrative Services for the Woodbridge School District. It was a wonderful tribute to an outstanding gentleman who is deeply missed by so many.

My congratulations to Chief Allen Parsons, Corporal Burke Parker, Patrolman First Class Adam Hitchens and Patrolman Chad Spicer for their continued hard work and community involvement. As reported by President Conaway, these police officers were presented with Certificates of Appreciation for their dedicated commitment to the Town of Bridgeville. We sincerely appreciate these officers and their many efforts on behalf of the community and its citizens.

Contact has been made with the S.P.C.A. to handle dogs running at large in Town. Please be sure your dog is controlled at all times. As a courtesy to your neighbors, and for the safety of your dog, please keep them controlled. For residents who walk their dogs, please do not allow them to defecate in other people's yards. Either take a plastic bag or a "pooper scooper" for clean up.

Be Prepared - Create an Emergency Plan

In the terrible aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, there could be no more important lesson learned than the need for Americans to be prepared. Please take some simple steps to plan for emergencies including organizing an emergency supply kit, making a family emergency plan and being aware of the type of emergencies that could affect our area. Emergencies can strike quickly and without warning. You may be forced to shelter in your home or be asked to evacuate. A hurricane, flash flood, hazardous material spill, tornado or winter storm could result in the loss of basic services to your home. Are you prepared to go without water, gas, electricity or telephone service for several days?


Delaware Governor Ruth Ann Minner urges all Delawareans to "learn more about how you can protect your family during an emergency. As we have learned through the tragic events caused by natural disasters in our country, knowing what to do in any emergency can save a life; I cannot emphasize enough how important it is to be prepared."

Emergency Kit Checklist

- One gallon of water per person, per day, 3-day supply. (Drinking /cooking/sanitation)
- Non-perishable, high-protein food items: energy bars, ready-to-eat soup, peanut butter, etc.
- Flashlight, battery-operated radio and extra batteries.
- First Aid Kit: Non-prescription/prescription medications, band-aids, thermometer, antiseptic, etc.
- Tools: Wrench, screwdriver, pliers, manual can opener, utility knife, duct tape, etc.
- Special needs for infants/children/elderly/disabled.
- Clothing and bedding: At least one complete change of clothing per person, sturdy shoes and gloves.
- Personal items: Eyeglasses, contact lenses and solutions, personal hygiene and sanitary items.
- Important Papers: Will, deed, birth certificate, insurance information, social security card, passport, immunization records, i.d. card, important phone numbers, bank account/credit card information. Consider storing these items in a waterproof portable container.
- Cash: During a power failure, credit cards and ATM's won't work!
