Y2K AND YOUR WATER, SEWER AND PUBLIC SAFETY SERVICES

We are not expecting any problems
with either water or sewer. We
have tested all of our automated
systems and they are compliant. In
the extremely unlikely event of a
loss of power, we have back-up gen-
erators to run the plant and more
than sufficient fuel to run them.
Again there should be no interruption
to your water and sewer services this
new year.

The Police Department will have
officers on duty 24 hours starting
12:00 am. In the event of a power
or phone outage, a police officer
will be stationed at the Bridgeville
Fire Hall until power and phone lines
are restored.

MINUTES OF THE COMMISSION.....

OCTOBER 11, 1999

- Commissioner Miles reported 183 traffic arrests and 21 criminal arrests. He reported the festival went smooth and thanked the officers from Bridgeville, Milford, Laurel, Greenwood, Seaford, and Georgetown for a job well done.
- Commissioner Singman reported the sewer main line at Walnut & Railroad Avenue had been repaired, but it was found that an elevation problem upstream needs attention in the near future.

The stream-crossing pipe line was repaired by Hopkins Construction. We are now getting prices for the dirt and stone needed to repair the bank on the south side.
- There were two septic haulers for a revenue of \$1,248.
- Commissioner Singman reported that one of the RBC gear-boxes needs a new bearing and seal replacement. A price quote was received of \$4,355.
- Commissioner Pierce reported an average daily water use of 122,000 gallons.
- The second reading and adoption of Ordinance #99-2 (Motor Vehicle Sound Limits) was approved by the Commission.
- President Dalton announced the new members of the Planning Commission as follows: Charles Hawk, Howard Hardesty, Kevin Carson, Jeff Scott, John Shockley, and from the Town Commission, Jack Dalton and Willie Pierce. Their first meeting will take place on Oct. 14th.
- The Commission approved to place a \$25 ad in the Woodbridge Football Booster's paper.
- Donations to the library and fire company were tabled until the Town finds out how much money they will have to pay for storm damage repairs from Hurricane Floyd.
- Commissioners voted to adopt a petition for the Town to support a spray irrigation system.

-Chief Allen Parson has discussed the loose dogs in Town with the SPCA.

NOVEMBER 8, 1999

- There were 241 traffic arrests and 131 criminal arrests.
- Chief Allen Parsons received the 1999 Rotary Club Community Service Award.
- Received revenue of \$1,780 from two septic haulers.
- Estimated received for a new silo heater (damaged during hurricane) of \$700. Approximate cost to repair roof at W.W.T.P. is \$15,000. A bid of \$1,400 was received to correct the erosion problem along the ditch bank with an estimate of \$700 to \$800 to extend more rip-rap where needed.
- All residents received the Consumer Confidence Report on Oct. 15th.
- Commissioner Sipple announced that Shea's Concrete of Milford will be installing new sidewalks and the handicap ramp at the Town Hall.
- The old evergreen tree across from Town Hall has been removed and replaced by one by the Lioness Club.
- President Dalton reported the storm damage from Hurricane Floyd to be \$100,000. At this point the Town nor the county have received any assistance from DEMA or FEMA.
- The building at 103 S. Main Street has been sold to Ms. Barbara O'Leary for \$46,000.
- Mr. Dale McDowell presented the Community Development Block Grant Loan Program. Money spent to rehab homes in our community in the last seven years is \$501,811 (53 homes).
- President Dalton reported that the newly formed Planning Commission met recently with representatives from DELDOT, DNREC, and the University of Delaware.
- Filing deadline for candidates who wish to fill Commission positions is Friday, December 10 at Noon. Those who would like to register to vote in the January 8, 2000 election

- have until Thursday, December 30, 1999.
- Dr. Roberta Burns has given her home at 105 S. Main Street to the Pilgrim Ministry of Deliverance Church, Inc. Mr. Tim Banks announced he would like to use the home for recovering drug and alcohol users. To date Mr. Banks has not applied for a Board of Adjustment hearing.
- A resident requested a large pothole be repaired on Cooper Alley.

DECEMBER 13, 1999:

- Traffic arrests totaled 135 with 12 criminal arrests.
- There was one septic hauler for a revenue of \$1,628.
- The stream-bank Kerosin still has not been repaired, but bids on the repair have been received.
- New sidewalks have been installed on North and South Cannon Street. Thanks to Sen. Adams and Rep. Ewing.
- The Town goes to settlement on the property located at 103 S Main St. on December 16th.
- It was voted to approve the renewal application from Donald Jones as a wastehauler in our disposal plant.
- Commission voted to disband with the alderman court.
- DELDOT gave the land located at the corner of Main and Market Streets to the Town of Bridgeville.
- Commissioners voted to have Dec. 17, 1999 as the Woodbridge High School Raiders Day in the Town of Bridgeville.
- It was voted to allow the Town employees to take their sick leave by the hour as needed.
- The police department will be receiving new uniforms in February (mostly purchased through grant money).

IMPORTANT NOTICE

ON OCTOBER 11, 1999 THE COMMISSION
ADOPTED THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE:

**ARTICLE VIII****MOTOR VEHICLE SOUND LIMITS****#222-208 DEFINITIONS:**

a) Excessive Noise Level: That level of noise which disturbs the peace, quiet, and comfort of any reasonable person of normal sensitiveness residing, visiting or working in the area.

b) Motor Vehicles: Any automobile, van, truck, motorcycle, or motor scooter.

c) Modified Exhaust System: An exhaust system in which the original noise abatement devices have been physically altered causing them to be less effective in reducing noise or the original abatement devices have either been removed or replaced by noise abatement devices which are not as effective in reducing noise as their original devices, or devices have been added to the original noise abatement devices such that noise levels are increased.

d) Sound System: A machine or device for the producing or reproducing of sound, including but not limited to radios, cassette tape players, and compact disc players.

e) Bicycle: That certain class of vehicles which is exclusively human powered by means of foot pedals, which the driver would normally ride astride, which have not in excess of 3 wheels and which may be commonly known as unicycles and bicycles.

f) Vehicles: Every device, upon which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn on a public highway, except devices moved by human power.

#222-209. USE RESTRICTIONS:

a) It shall be unlawful for any person within Town limits to use or operate a sound system in a motor vehicle, on a bicycle or vehicle at an excessive noise level.

b) It shall be unlawful for any person within Town limits to operate a motor vehicle which causes excessive noise levels as a result of a defective or modified exhaust system or unnecessary engine revving.

#222-210 PENALTY:

Whoever violates this section for the first offense shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00. For each subsequent like offense he/she shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00.

ON SEPTEMBER 16, 1999 THE COMMISSION ADOPTED THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE:

ARTICLE XI**PLANNING COMMISSION**

The Commissioners of Bridgeville adopted this article for a Planning Commission because of mandate from the state. The Planning Commission shall have the power and the authority vested in the Municipal Planning Commissions by Chapter 7 of Title 22 of the Delaware Code and any amendments thereto, or of this Chapter to prepare a comprehensive plan setting forth the municipal development strategy for the Town.

Selected to serve are: Chairman Howard Hardesty, Secretary Kevin Carson, John Shockley, Jeff Scott, Charles Hawk, and from the Town Commission, Willie Pierce and Jack Dalton.

All meetings are open to the public and all records of this Commission shall be a public record.

HANDY TRICKS AND TIPS

SPEEDY SWEET TREATSSHORTCUT FUDGE

1 pkg. (3.4 oz) cook & serve choco. pudding mix
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 cup evaporated milk
 1 tablespoon butter (no subs), softened
 1 cup chopped pecans

In a heavy saucepan, combine dry pudding mix, sugar, milk and butter. Bring to a boil; boil and stir until a candy thermometer reads 224 (about 3 minutes). Remove from the heat and beat rapidly for 1 minute. Add pecans, continue beating until mixture thickens slightly. Drop by tablespoon onto waxed paperlined baking sheets. Refrigerate until firm (about 45 min). Yield: 3/4 pound.

CHOCOLATE-DIPPED TREATS

1 cup (6 oz) semisweet choco chips
 1 tablespoon shortening
 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 Large marshmallows, miniature pretzel twist and/or whole fresh strawberries

In a microwave or heavy saucepan, melt chocolate chips and shortening. Stir in cinnamon. Dip three-quarters of each marshmallow, pretzel and/or strawberries in chocolate. Place on waxed paperlined baking sheet. Refrigerate until set, about 30 minutes. Yield: about 4 dozen.

COCONUT DROPS

1 pkg. (14 oz) flaked coconut
 6 drops red food coloring
 6 drops green food coloring
 1 pound white candy coating

Divide coconut between two bowls. Add red food coloring to one bowl and green to other. Toss to coat. In a heavy saucepan over low heat, melt candy coating. Drop by tablespoonfuls onto waxed paper. While coating is still warm, sprinkle half of each drop with pine coconut and the other half with green; press down gently. Refrigerator until firm. Yield: 1 1/4 pounds.
