## **MINUTES**

### **COMMISSIONERS OF BRIDGEVILLE MAY 11, 1998 - 7:00 P.M. TOWN HALL**

#### **I. CALL TO ORDER**

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by President Robert Bennett. Present were: Commissioner Margaret Sipple and Commissioner Jack Dalton. Mr. Dennis Schrader, Town Solicitor, was also present. A quorum was present. The meeting started with a salute to the flag.

#### **II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

Commissioner Sipple made a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes. Motion was seconded by Commissioner Dalton and carried unanimously.

#### **III. APPROVAL OF MONTHLY BILLS**

See breakdown per fund attached. Commissioner Dalton said under the water department there is a bill of \$347.85 which is the semi-annual purchase of chemicals from Intercoastal Trading. After some discussion, Commissioner Dalton made a motion to approve the monthly bills. Motion was seconded by Commissioner Sipple and carried unanimously.

#### **IV. PRESIDENT'S REPORTS**

##### **A. CORRESPONDENCE**

1. President Bennett read a letter from the New Liberty Church requesting permission to sponsor a fun day with parade. The scheduled date is Saturday, July 11, 1998 beginning at twelve noon. They would like the parade route to start at Laverty Lane on South Main, turn left on Church Street and end at the Woodbridge ECEC School. The pastor of the church said he is expecting approximately 600 people to participate in the event. They are asking if the streets mentioned could be closed to traffic for several hours on that date, and if any other permits are needed for the event. President Bennett said that date falls on a peak summer weekend. He said DELDOT will be directing traffic through Church Street until the end of July while working on the by-pass.

Commissioner Dalton said if we had the police force available that day, a barrier or detour could be set up for a couple of hours on Main Street for the parade time. Traffic could be directed to use South Cannon Street and Jacobs Avenue for that period of time.

He was not sure how Church Street would be affected if DEIDOT is detouring traffic along that route. Commissioner Dalton said the main thing is to try to accommodate what Pastor Riley is trying to do. He said it might be able to be carried out if the Town Police could handle Main Street and the detours, and the State could handle Church Street. Commissioner Dalton suggested the Town check with DEIDOT to see if they could help on that weekend, and also check with the police department.

2. Commissioner Dalton said the Commission received a copy of a letter that was sent to Mr. Frank Calio from Mr. John Nichols of Teddy Bear Enterprises of Bridgeville. The letter was in reference to a chemical company that would be willing to locate in the Bridgeville area to extract various nutrient chemicals, like nitrogen and phosphates from the chicken manure that is accumulated from the local chicken growers. Commissioner Dalton said he had discussed this matter with Mr. Calio last week. He was told there is a company looking to locate in this area for the processing of something like this, but they are looking for an existing building. He said currently they are looking at the old feed mill west of Seaford. Commissioner Dalton said he applauded Mr. Nichols for his action in ideas to bring new industry to our community, but he has concern whether this is the type of industry we are looking for.

President Bennett said when Mr. Calio attended the breakfast last month, it seemed like companies relocating wanted to find existing buildings. President Bennett said he did not know how much land near the Town is available.

## B. DEPARTMENT REPORTS

1. Police - See attached report. President Bennett reported there were 55 complaints for the month. Total traffic arrests were 243.

2. Waste Water - See report attached. President Bennett reported the average daily flow was 190,000 gallons with total monthly flow being 5,712,000 gallons. There were no N.P.D.E.S. violations. He reported there were four septic haulers for the month of April dumping 65,330 gallons. Revenue received totaled \$2,612.00. President Bennett said the clarifier sludge pump approved for a purchase price of \$4,000.00 at last month's meeting does not come with a written warranty. He said the next price, with warranty, is \$6,955.00 which includes \$2,000.00 for piping, installation and wiring.

3. Drinking Water - See report attached. Commissioner Dalton reported 3,417,000 gallons were pumped for the month averaging of 114,000 gallons per day. Commissioner Dalton said we have just completed with the Sussex County Board of Commissioners of the Western Sussex Water and Sewer Plan. He explained this study was commissioned by the County Council to evaluate the water and waste water needs for the area (Harrington/Greenwood County line to the Maryland State line) through the year 2020 and is included as part of the Sussex County Comprehensive Plan. He said the County is going to be steering development for residential and commercial towards towns that already have existing facilities. This study evaluates the current waste water systems. He said as far as Bridgeville is concerned, we have the capacity necessary to handle the projected growth through the year 2020. Bridgeville may need to increase our biological

load back to the 800,000 gallons that was initially planned for our treatment plant. Commissioner Dalton said our load capacity is approximately 560,000 gallons per day.

Commissioner Dalton said the County might install a waste treatment plant in the Blades area. He said the study recommends the Town of Greenwood re-negotiate with Bridgeville to allow them to have additional capacity since they are continuing to develop. He said on the waste water side, Bridgeville is in a good position as far as the next twenty years are concerned. Commissioner Dalton said on the water supply side Bridgeville is in a good position. With the two new wells, Bridgeville has the capacity to handle most of what is going to happen around the Town through that time period.

Commissioner Dalton said it is recommended that municipalities who are expecting growth should ~~to~~ consider applying for a Certificate of Public Necessity (CPCN) through DNREC prior to extending water service. This means any provider of water service must acquire a franchise permit. The municipalities have to submit how many gallons they will be pumping, how it will be used, and what their plan will be. Commissioner Dalton said there are companies in this area that are very aggressively taking up the CPCN to establish franchises. He said the reason Bridgeville should be concerned is that a private company could file for such a permit for this area. When development started around Bridgeville, the Town could be placed in a situation where people moving in would have water provided by that company, but the Town would be furnishing other services. Commissioner Dalton said the Town would probably be wise to research what is necessary to start negotiations now in dealing with DNREC in getting the CPCN permits in place. This way if development should start in our area, they would have to use our water and waste water facility. He said the charter allows us to extend up to three miles from Town limits at this point. Commissioner Dalton said he would look into obtaining the application forms. President Bennett asked him to bring the forms to the June meeting.

4. Streets - Commissioner Sipple reported that the flowers had been planted around the Town Hall. She said last month it was discussed about signs being erected directing trucks to use the by-pass when it is completed. Commissioner Sipple said she had contacted someone at DELDOT. A sign is to be posted on Rt. 404 West stating no trucks over 5,000 pound should come through Town. She was told if the Town wanted a sign on the east side of Town for west bound traffic, we would have to contact the sign division in Dover. President Bennett said he requested a sign be placed out by Smith's Packing House pertaining to the closing of Alt. 13 Northbound. He also said he discussed the truck by-pass with Chief Handley Orr regarding the trucks coming through Town. The chief told him the regulations are already in existence as far as the truck route is concerned. President Bennett said when the State installed them before, they asked the Town to wait on enforcing the truck ordinance until the by-pass was finished.

## V. OLD BUSINESS

1. President Bennett reported that Clean-Up Day a couple of blocks on Delaware Avenue and Pine Alley whe e said he talked with the boss at BFI, and eight days later they did come back and collect the trash they missed. BFI picked up four and one- half truck loads of trash on that one day. A BFI representative told President Bennett it was the most trash he had ever seen picked up in one small Town in one day!

## VI. NEW BUSINESS

1. President Bennett said the newsletter items need to be turned in to Alma Fleetwood by May 26, 1998 or sooner.

2. President Bennett said Jimmy's Grille has added an additional fifty seats to the restaurant which needs to be billed to him. The formula for billing is as follows:  
 $50 \times 35 \text{ gallons per seat} = 1750 \text{ divided by } 300 \text{ EDU'S} = 5.8 \text{ EDU'S}$ :  
 $5.8 \times \$900.00 \text{ (sewer tapping fees)} = \$5,220.00$ . President Bennett said last time Mr. Tennefoss added on, the Town waived that fee of several thousands of dollars. Commissioner Dalton said the above formula includes a reduced rate.

President Bennett said Mr. Tennefoss obtained a permit for one day from the County to erect a tent for serving purposes on Mother's Day. President Bennett said he should have contacted the Town concerning the extra sewer usage. He asked the Commission how they wanted to bill Mr. Tennefoss, based on extra seating for the day or people served that day. Commissioner Dalton said he would like to table the matter until the June, 1998 meeting.

3. Mr. George Hardesty representing the Bridgeville Kiwanis Club reported to the Commission that the club was in favor of the Town promoting economic development, and the hiring of a town manager with grant writing experience or a part-time grants coordinator (See letter attached).

President Bennett said he has a meeting scheduled with Ms. Roberta Nelson, Town Manager of Delmar, who has hired a part-time grant writer for that town. The grant writer works on a commission basis. President Bennett said he thinks our residents have a bad opinion about grant writers due to the fact that the last one hired by the Town never obtained any grant money for the town. President Bennett said maybe they should wait to discuss a Town Manager until all the seats have been filled again on the Commission.

Commissioner Dalton said the Commission sends its best wishes to the Kiwanis Club and other Town business people who would consider a Chamber of Commerce. He said the Commerce must be separate from the Town's governing body. Commissioner Dalton feels the Town could have or should have a Chamber of Commerce. He said there are not a lot of businesses in Town, but they are very good business people.

4. Even though Mr. Robert Slater and Mr. Charles Singman were not present, President Bennett said he had a "Certificate of Appreciation" and a key to the Town for the service to the Town.

5. President Bennett said the Commission had made a mistake last month by appointing a new Commissioner to take Mr. Singman's place because it was not posted on the agenda, and under the Freedom of Information Act, it would have had to be posted.

Commissioner Dalton said he would like to explain to Mr. Schrader about the comment he had made in last month's meeting pertaining to only one seat being filled. He said the reason it was told was because President Bennett had told the Commission that was the way it had to be done, and the other seat had to be submitted for election. President Bennett replied he did not state it that way. He told the Commission that Mr. Schrader was working on the law stating that an appointment could be made, therefore doing away with an election for a person who had more than a year to serve.

Mr. Schrader explained he had submitted to the legislators, on behalf of the Town, a proposed amendment to the Charter that would repeal one of the two provisions in the Charter relating to the filling of a vacancy created on a Commission. The first appears in the fourth paragraph of Section 5. He said under this Charter provision a special election would have to be held to fill the term of Mr. Slater. Mr. Singman's term is less than one year so an appointment could be made. Mr. Schrader said the problem is under Section 13A where it states any vacancy can be filled by appointment until the next election which occurs in January. Mr. Schrader said the instructions he received was to remove the provisions in Section 13A which he submitted to Senator Thurman Adams and Representative Ben Ewing. He said the amendment, at present, has been adopted by 2/3 vote in the Senate and now must be brought to the attention of the House of Representatives this week and then signed by the governor.

Commissioner Dalton said he did not find anything wrong with appointing Mr. Glenn Miles last month to replace Mr. Singman. Mr. Schrader explained that under the State Freedom Information Act the appointment was not on the agenda for last month's meeting. Commissioner Dalton questioned the legality of anything that the committee brought up in a meeting, and is not posted on the agenda. Mr. Schrader said any item that is brought up during a Commission meeting and is not on the agenda, where official action is taken it is a slam dunk void. President Bennett said an agenda must be posted seven days before the meeting unless it is an emergency situation. Mr. Schrader explained there are more things than just the agenda. He said meetings have to be held within the Town limits. Meetings of two or more people who are on the Commission can be considered a committee meeting (if Town business was discussed) and must be advertised or put on the agenda. He said even if two Commissioners met on the street and started talking Town business, it could be considered a committee meeting and must be published. The Miles' election, though not yet void, would not take too terribly long to be voided by the courts, because it does violate the Freedom of Information Act. The second problem was that it was not voted unanimously by all Commissioners as was stated in the minutes. President Bennett did not vote, and as a result of that, Mr. Miles only received two votes of the total Commission. Mr. Schrader further explained to the Commission the way the courts view appointments of elected officials.

President Bennett said as it stands now there is one Commission vacancy for a term left of more than a year, and one vacancy for less than a year's term. He said there are three candidates interested in the positions: Mr. Glenn Miles, Mr. Charles Royal and Mr. Howard Hardesty. Mr. Schrader said he recommends the Commission let the proposed amendment pass the House of Representatives to clean up the Charter provisions. Then once approved, the conflicting requirements will be taken care of. He said when you get to Mr. Singman's seat, the question will be whether there is someone who can be unanimously appointed. Then you can go to the election for Mr. Slater's seat, but time is running out. Mr. Slater resigned as of April 1, 1998 and Charter the states the election must be held within 60 days. President Bennett asked if the House were to pass the amendment in the near future, could a special meeting be scheduled for the election of a Commissioner. Mr. Schrader said it could be scheduled tonight, and if the House has not voted, then that meeting could be postponed until the next Monday. President Bennett set a special meeting for Monday, May 18, 1998 for the appointment of one Commissioner. President Bennett said all candidates interested in the Commission vacancy should submit a letter of intent to him or to Commissioner Sipple specifying the term they are interested in.

6. President Bennett said he had compiled the letters received concerning the community wide trash collection. From the letters received, he stated odds are 4-2 against the collection. Commissioner Dalton said residents have asked him if they would have to pay for pick up even if they take their trash to their business location. President Bennett said some people take their trash out on the Denton Road for a cost of \$1.00 a bag. Commissioner Dalton said he counted fifteen letters received, with eight against and seven for the pick up. Commissioner Sipple said they would still like to have input from the residents. President Bennett told those in attendance that residents could call Alma Fleetwood with their comments on the trash collection.

7. President Bennett said the real estate transfer tax has been approved by the legislators. The first reading has to be scheduled for the June, 1998 meeting. Mr. Schrader said on March 24, 1998 the General Assembly and Governor Carper approved the amendment to the Charter to allow the Commissioners to have the opportunity to levy and assess a transfer tax on the sale of real estate property in the Town of Bridgeville. Mr. Schrader presented the Commission with an ordinance to revise for the levying of the transfer tax at the rate of 1%. It would not affect certain types of transfers which are the same as the Delaware Transfer Tax or the Sussex County Transfer Tax. It authorizes President Bennett to enter into an agreement with the Recorder of Deeds of Sussex County to collect said transfer tax. It would permit the recorder to collect 1% of the sums collected as a commission for the Town. Some of the things that are typically exempt are: transfer by a will; by a mortgage; by a lease; when a divorce occurs and property has to be divided; fire company; religious organizations, etc. Mr. Schrader said once the ordinance is adopted the transfer tax will become effective upon its adoption and would effect any contract after the adoption date.

## VII. CITIZENS PRIVILEGE

1. Mr. George Hardesty said as long as an election had to be held soon, whether the question relating to the trash collection could be put on the ballot. That way residents would have the opportunity to pass their opinions. Mr. Schrader said a non-binding referendum could be done. Mr. Hardesty said maybe a separate form could be available that day to get residents' ideas on the matter. President Bennett said an article was in the newsletter, and only fifteen people responded out of a thousand newsletters that went out. Commissioner Dalton thought Mr. Hardesty's idea was a good one. Mr. Schrader said there are a lot of details that need to be ironed out concerning the trash pick up, but the polling would give a broad concept of what the residents want. President Bennett said everyone that receives a water bill will receive the additional cost of the trash collection. Commissioner Dalton stated there are people who are going to be negatively impacted. He thinks the majority of people in Town will be positive about the collection, because it will be cheaper than what they are paying at present.

President Bennett said, for instance, he is paying \$65.00 a quarter. He said if you call the same company today the charge will be \$45.00. Commissioner Dalton said then in 90 days they will increase it to the \$65.00. President Bennett thinks it can be done somewhere between \$35.00 and \$40.00 community wide. Mr. Hardesty asked if he would receive a trash collection bill for his empty lot. President Bennett said that was a good question. President Bennett said he checked with other towns, and they take the total number of water meters and divide the total cost of trash collection. Commissioner Dalton asked how an apartment building would be billed. Some have one meter and three apartments, or there could be one meter for each apartment. Mr. Schrader said people should not be charged for a service they do not need. President Bennett said the collection only pertains to residents not commercial establishments. President Bennett said if the community wide trash collection is approved, there are a lot of details to work out. Commissioner Dalton said when the bids go out to the different companies, we will have to ask them what constitutes a household and how many containers will be available for apartment buildings. President Bennett said a representative from BFI would be glad to come to a meeting and explain how they work with other towns. President Bennett commented that people have said it might put the small trash haulers out of business, but it seems there are not many small companies any longer. He said there are only two large companies that own most of them nationwide.

2. Mrs. Cindy Truitt read a letter addressed to all Commissioners (see attached letter).

3. Mr. Chuck Royal thanked Mrs. Truitt for her concern in the community. He said when he moved to Town he was involved with starting a Block Watch in the community. Mr. Royal said he has noticed that has kind of diminished, but the crime has not. He would like the newsletter in the future to make note of such. He said maybe this would encourage citizens to watch out for each other. He also said it would be a good idea to inform the citizens of how to report a crime.

Mr. Royal asked the Commission if there was a good communicating relationship between the Town and the Perdue plant. He said residents on Church Street are complaining about the trucks that pass through so often and about how noisy they are. President Bennett said once the by-pass is opened, trucks will be using that route instead of coming through Town. Church Street is also to be paved this summer.

Mr. Royal asked if the Town is thinking about negotiating with the State Police for them to patrol the Town of Bridgeville. President Bennett said he had not heard anything like that. Commissioner Dalton said Bridgeville does have a working relationship with Greenwood, Seaford and the State Police.

4. Mr. Lonnie Hilliard asked if one car space could be allowed to park in front of 128 N. Main Street and Church Street. He explained that right now a yellow line is painted quite some distance from the corner of Church Street going south on Main Street. He said the line goes all the way to the house which is next door to the church. President Bennett said he would take a look at it. Mr. Hilliard said it would be helpful to have an open parking space in front of the building.

5. Mrs. Pat Correll said she is confused about the special election. She said she understood the House and the Senate was sent a change amendment to the charter so two people could be appointed to fill the Commission vacancy. She asked if that was not going to take place, and if an election will take place to replace Mr. Slater. Mr. Schrader said because Mr. Slater's term has left more than one year vacant, an election will have to take place. For Mr. Singman's term, which is less than one year left, an appointment can take place. She asked why the Town had to go to the legislators to get a charter change. Mr. Schrader explained there are two charter provisions on the same subject that conflict with each other. He said what he wrote to Senator Adams and Rep. Ewing was that in some point and time, Section 13A was adopted by the General Assembly at the request of the Commission at that time. Mr. Schrader further explained that they failed to repeal the first paragraph of Section 5 at that time. He told Ms. Correll an election will be held for Mr. Slater's replacement because his term is in excess of one year, and that person will remain until the end of that term. The other vacancy is less than one year, and the Commission can appoint someone until the January election. Mr. Schrader said this move is to clear up the two different provisions in the Charter. He said there is a big problem right now because two people have quit the Commission, and there are two inconsistent provisions, and it has all come at one time.

Mrs. Truitt asked when it is time to appoint someone, would the Commission be taking input from the public as to who they would like to see appointed. President Bennett said they would take any information available. Mrs. Correll said this election information should be put in the paper immediately to give people time to file.

6. Mr. Royal said everyone is familiar with what happened out to McDonald's place concerning water and sewer several years ago. He said the Town does not supply the water to that whole area. Mr. Schrader said when Mr. John Scott developed the property at the intersection of Rt. 404 and 13 there was already in existence a CPCN for that particular property. He said for a long time it was the pet project of the water suppliers in Delaware to file for CPCN'S. He said it may very well be that what Commissioner Dalton

has suggested as a good idea may turn out to be one that is not going to bare a lot of fruit. Mr. Royal wanted to know the legal aspect of not supplying someone water if they do not want to use our sewer facilities. Mr. Schrader said if the property is inside of Town we cannot refuse them, but if the property is outside of Town they have a choice. Commissioner Dalton said the Town Charter grants extended service three miles outside of Town limits. He said he would look for the CPCN for that three mile radius. President Bennett said if too many are taken on outside of Town, a costly new well might have to be driven.

Commissioner Dalton said the current study is based on the amount of water the Town has available right now. The study was done by Witman and Rickard and if the County Council should direct a development to this Town, the capacity right now could handle the area immediately around Bridgeville through the year 2020. Commissioner Dalton said the Town will need to consider additional storage because the tank we have now is not sufficient for the increase. He said serious consideration needs to be made for painting that tank and doing preventive maintenance or we could be in a lot more serious trouble with that tank.

President Bennett said the Medical Center on Rt. 40 will soon be on the Town's sewer line. They are paying for the cost of the sewer from the corner of Rt. 13 and Rt. 40 to Smith's Packing House, but they will retain their own water supply. He also stated they will be paying Town taxes. Mrs. Correll said property could have hooked into the lines that cross her property on Rt. 40, but President Bennett said that line was not a raw sewage line.

7. Mrs. Truitt said on Mother's Day Jimmy's Grille added a \$5.00 tip to each person who ate their meal under the rented tent only. Mrs. Correll said a co-worker went to the buffet with a party of four. She said they each paid \$7.95 each for the meal and one child under 12 paid \$5.95 and her friend paid his own choice of a tip. He did not pay \$5.00 for each in the tent.

8. Mr. Royal wanted to know if the Town could clean out the branch at the bridge on North Cannon Street. President Bennett said when the Boot Camp men return they are to clean up the branch on North Main Street so they can do North Cannon Street too.

9. Commissioner Dalton said he understood the Laws Street Paving Project was to be completed in 30 days. He wanted to know why the street is still torn up. President Bennett explained three catch basins had to be installed which were not in the initial plans. President Bennett said he had just signed the change order for the additional work that needed to be done.

## I. EXECUTIVE SESSION


President Bennett entertained a motion to convene to executive session. Motion was so moved by Commissioner Dalton and seconded by Commissioner Sipple; carried unanimously.

I. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by President Robert Bennett. Present were Commissioners Jack Dalton and Margaret Sipple. A quorum was present. The meeting began with a salute to the flag.

II. NEW BUSINESS

President Bennett announced that the purpose of this meeting was to appoint two commissioners. Commissioners Dalton and Sipple were unaware that two commissioners were to be appointed. They believed that only one commissioner was to be appointed. President Bennett stated that a change in the law had occurred earlier this afternoon. The governor had signed this change stating vacancies will be filled by appointment until the next election, which in turn means the commissioners would appoint two commissioners tonight, if there were applicants who had expressed their desires for seats on the commission. The applicant to fill former Commissioner Robert Slater's seat would only be appointed until the next election. At that time, he/she would have to run for a year, if he/she wanted to keep the commissioner's seat. That was the decision that the quorum present had wanted to begin with to save the cost of a special election. President Bennett stated that the Town Solicitor had told him today that he had a misunderstanding from last week's regular town meeting. President Bennett then passed out copies of the vacancy change.

Two letters had been received requesting consideration for appointment for the two vacant seats. One was from Charles Royal. He was filing to run for the unexpired term of former Commissioner Robert Slater. The other letter was from Glenn Miles, who was filing for an appointment or for an elected Town Official. Because there were only two letters received, the Chair moved that Charles Royal be appointed to Robert Slater's unexpired term which will end in January 1999, and Glenn Miles be appointed to Charles Singman's unexpired term which will also end in January 1999. The motion was seconded by Jack Dalton and was carried unanimously by all three commissioners.

President Bennett then told Mr. Royal and Mr. Miles that he would try to have the Alderman attend June's regular meeting to swear them into office. President

Bennett believed that he could legally do it at this time, but it had not been posted on the agenda.

Because this was the only business on the agenda, Commissioner Sipple made a motion to adjourn. President Bennett requested an Executive Session be held. Commissioner Dalton seconded the motion to adjourn from the Special Meeting; Motion was carried unanimously. President Bennett thanked those present for attending the Special Meeting.

#### VIII. EXECUTIVE SESSION

At 7:07 p.m., President Bennett, Commissioners Dalton and Sipple went into Executive Session. They returned from Executive Session at 7:20 p.m. No motions were made.

#### IX. ADJOURNMENT

Commissioner Sipple made a motion to adjourn the meeting. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dalton; Motion was carried unanimously. Meeting was adjourned at 7:20 p.m.







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**COMMISSIONER'S MEETING**

**May 11, 1998**

Gallons pumped for the month 3,417,000. An average of 114,000 gallons per day.

We have finished our work of the last year with the county sponsored Western Sussex Water and Sewer Plan and the final report has been presented to County Council. This study has evaluated the water and waste water needs for the area through the year 2020 and is included as part of the 1997 Sussex County Comprehensive Plan. This plan is what the county and state will use to direct future development toward the towns that have the infrastructure to serve this growth and to minimize random development throughout the county.

The conclusion of the report pertaining to Bridgeville is that we have sufficient water and waste water treatment capacity to serve the projected growth. Two points that they make that we should be aware of and plan for are that during this period we will need additional water storage capacity and we would be wise to apply for a franchise for the area surrounding the town.

We know already that our existing storage tank will soon be in need of painting and maintenance as pointed out by the leak we had to repair last year. We would be wise to keep an eye on development if the area to make sure we plan on additional storage prior to it being needed so we have time to plan for it.

Concerning the franchise, all water extensions are governed by the Franchise Water Program as administered by DNREC. All water utilities, including municipalities must apply for Certificates of Public Necessity through DNREC prior to extending water service. Our town charter allows us to extend service up to three miles outside the town limits. This would be an incentive to have developed areas to be annexed into the town to take advantage of these services. What we want to be aware of is that the water industry in Sussex County is becoming very competitive and we could be faced with a situation where a private water company would file for and receive a CPCN for the area around town so that we would be forced to provide other town services such as police protection but would not receive an income from the water service.

For this reason, We suggest that the Board consider applying to DNREC for the CPCN before someone else does.

## Citizens asked to observe and report suspicious activity

**Remember** - Effective crime prevention starts with the eyes and ears of the community.

Being on the look out for suspicious behavior, and then reporting it to the authorities, will help deter and solve crimes.

The following suspicious behaviors could indicate a crime is in progress. Be watchful for:

- Someone going door-to-door in a neighborhood. If the person tries the door to see if it is locked, or looks into windows, or goes into a backyard, they are more likely a potential burglar than a salesperson.
- Someone who walks casually through a neighborhood looking into automobiles, backyards, etc.
- Someone who appears to be forcing entry into a residence, business, or car.
- Someone removing license plates, gas, or accessories from a parked car.
- Parked, occupies vehicles at an unusual hour and in an unusual place.
- Abandoned vehicles parked for a long time. The vehicle could be stolen.
- Persons making a quick change of vehicles. They may be abandoning a stolen car.
- Persons being forced into vehicles.
- Cars moving slowly and without lights.
- Apparent business transactions being conducted from a vehicle. It could be a drug sale or involve stolen property.
- A person running while carrying items.
- Someone loitering around schools, parks, residences, and businesses for an extended time. It could be a possible burglar or sex offender.
- Lights or noise from a neighboring home you know to be unoccupied.
- Any screams.

Use common sense, caution, and continual awareness of what is happening around you as you walk, drive, work, or play.

Remember that if you see any suspicious activity, call the police, and call the home owner, business, or school.

Above all, don't assume that others have already called the police, and don't worry about being considered a "nosy neighbor."
