

COMMISSIONERS OF BRIDGEVILLE
REGULAR MEETING
MARCH 12, 1979

Meeting was called to order at 8 P. M. by President Robert L. Mulvaney.

Members present were: William Hartzell, A. L. Jones, James S. Evans and Robert L. Mulvaney. Absent: Earl C. Willey.

Also present were: Virgil L. Kinder, Town Alderman, Ronald Wilson, Chief of Police, Guy McClary, Mr. & Mrs. Barry Johnson, a lady reporter from the Seaford Leader and Kyle Ewing.

Minutes of previous meeting was read by Sec. James S. Evans. Motion was made by William Hartzell to accept minutes as read. Seconded by Al Jones and approved by the board.

Bills for the month of February were reviewed and a motion was made by Al Jones to pay bills as presented totaling \$6,809.41. Copy attached herewith. William Hartzell seconded the motion for payment. Approved by board.

President Mulvaney told the board that the town assessment was completed and would be hung at the Post Office, Baltimore Trust Co. and H. C. Layton's hardware store for the townspeople to see.

Appeal day would be the last Saturday in March from one to four at the Town Hall. This would be on March 24, 1979. At which time Commissioners would be here to assist anyone about their assessment.

President Mulvaney also said that there would be two hearings on Revenue Sharing Funds on Wednesday night, March 21 and Wednesday night March 28 to all interested persons.

There was a discussion on fixing the signs as you enter Bridgeville that says, "If you lived here you would be home now." The town plus the Lions and Kiwanis Clubs will have a part in this.

Kyle Ewing came to ask the Town if they could pay the electric bill for the Little League Ball Club which would be around \$600.00. He was invited back to the Revenue Sharing Meeting to further discuss this request.

Mr. Mulvaney announced that Mr. James S. Evans, who is now Secretary, will also be the Water Commissioner. Years ago the Sewer and Water Commissioner were taken care of by one person but that was before we had the Waste Treatment Plant which involves a lot of work. The two together is too much for one person.

The Johnsons came in response to a letter that the Board had written them to find out what their plans were for the home that was burned on Del. Ave. where they lived. The Board had been concerned about the possibility of children fooling around it. The Johnsons said they plan on restoring the house when money is available from the insurance company. Mr. Mulvaney told the Johnsons that he would look into the possibility of getting some snow fence from the state to put around the building. Johnsons said they would appreciate any help.

Mr. Guy McClary has opened a amusement and recreation place located on Market Street. He asked the board what hours and ages of children he should let come in. The board agreed that 12 years olds could go

but they must leave at 9 P. M. The place would open from four till nine on week days, on Friday four till ten and Saturday from 10 A. M. until 11 P. M. All children from 12 to 16 must leave by nine P. M.. This will be posted in the building.

Mr. Hartzell made a motion to grant Guy McClary a minimum age of 12 years as the age limit. This was seconded by Al Jones and approved by the Board.

Mr. Mulvaney read a letter from Mrs. Dewey asking permission to rent former town dump for car storage and she was willing to pay the sum of \$300.00 per year for two years to see how profitable it turned out for them. Motion was made by Al Jones that if they would accept the insurance qualifications that would be needed for a place of this kind he would say we rent to them. This was seconded by William Hartzell and approved by the board.

Mr. Mulvaney read a letter from a concerned citizen on Cedar Street and he felt that his street had been very neglected during the past snow storm.

Mr. Mulvaney hopes that better preperation will be made for future snow emergencies.

Ronald Wilson suggested that the Town write a letter to Richard Pepper, Manager of Georgetown, thanking him for the barracades that he loaned to the Town when they were so badly needed.


Mr. Wilson will also check with Wayne Ellingsworth to see if there would be any help through Civil Defense for emergencies in the Town.

Mr. Mulvaney read a letter from Mr. and Mrs. Elrick Quillen concerning the house next door to them that lets weeds grow in the Summer and stores a boat in the back year that is fairly rotten. This house is located on Main Street and is owned by Mrs. Ethel Street. Mr. Mulvaney said he would look into the matter.

Mr. Hartzell said he would ask Mr. Ray Pusey about lights to help summer traffic and he would invite him to the regular meeting the second Monday in the month of April.

Meeting adjourned at 9:45 P. M.
